Courses for Entering Freshman 2010

The following courses are open to students entering Chaminade as freshmen in the fall of 2010. These classes meet as indicated from June 21st through July 28th.

**In the event that classes are over-enrolled, it is possible that additional sections may be offered. The additional sections may be earlier or later than the time listed below. In the event of overflow sections, students will be scheduled on a first come - first serve basis.

English

Entering Freshman English (Entering 9th grade)

Class A June 21 - July 28

M - F 8:00 - 10:15 AM

Class C June 21 - July 28

Fee: \$410 per course

This course is intended to review and further develop basic composition and critical thinking skills in preparation for College Preparatory English. The basic elements of composition - thesis statement, topic sentences, concrete detail, commentary/analysis - are emphasized, and writing fundamentals such as proper grammar, spelling and syntax are extensively reviewed. Literature will be examined through the genres of poetry, drama, short stories, and the required summer reading novels. *Students should enroll in either Class A, Class B or Class C, according to their scheduling preference, NOT all classes. The same curriculum is covered in all three classes.*

9th Grade Summer Reading Prep (Entering 9th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M W F 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M W F 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$255 per session

In this course, students will discuss the summer reading novels assigned to incoming freshmen. One novel will be focused on per session. Led by an English faculty member, this course is designed to build reading proficiency and enhance student awareness of the various literary elements in the literature. This course gives students a valuable opportunity to engage in an in-depth analytical study and discussion of the novels before school begins.

Mathematics

Entering Freshman Algebra I Prep (Entering 9th grade)

June 21 - July 28

M - F 10:30 AM - 12:45 PM

Fee: \$410

This course is intended to both review and further develop basic skills in preparation for College Preparatory Algebra I. It will examine the properties of the real numbers, solutions of linear equations, inequalities, problem-solving techniques, graphing, factoring, polynomial computation, rational and irrational expressions, as well as an introduction to quadratics.

Geometry Prep (Entering 9th-12th grade)

June 21 - July 28

M - F 8:00 - 10:15 AM

Fee: \$410

This course is intended to both review and further develop basic skills in preparation for College Preparatory Geometry. All basic skills will be covered, along with a sneak peek at what to expect in the next course and an in-depth study in the use of the graphic calculator. Additional materials may need to be purchased. This workshop is HIGHLY recommended for students who received a "C" in Algebra I, wherever and whenever it was taken. _ **Prerequisite: Successful completion of Algebra I**

The demands of a College Preparatory high school can be very challenging to freshmen students who are learning about their new campus, meeting new people, and juggling demanding courses and extracurricular activities. But the challenge can be overcome. This summer session course offers students the tools they need to succeed. Students will acquire important skills including time management, laptop use, library research, organization, note taking, listening, critical thinking and writing, and also familiarize themselves with the Chaminade block schedule and campus. **Students should enroll in either Class A, Class B or Class C according to their scheduling preference, NOT all three classes. The same curriculum will be covered in all of the classes.**

Daily Courses for High School Students

The following courses are open to continuing high school students as indicated. Courses meet daily from 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM. First semester material is covered in Semester I, and second semester material is covered in Semester II. Non-Chaminade students may take courses for credit to work ahead unless otherwise indicated in the course description. All courses present fully accredited college preparatory curriculum, which meet or exceed requirements for public schools. It is recommended that non-Chaminade students obtain written permission for courses to be taken from their school administration, although it is not required by Chaminade for enrollment. Chaminade students may only take these courses for remedial purposes, unless otherwise indicated in the course description.

English

Critical Thinking and Composition (Entering 12th grade, Open to Chaminade students only)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per course

This intensive accelerated writing course is most suitable for incoming seniors who are already strong proficient writers. Condensing the regular 18-week curriculum into 2 weeks, the course is designed to reinforce and further develop the critical reading, thinking, and writing skills that students need for success in their college courses. In a process-centered writing program that includes feedback and revision, students write research-based argumentative essays in a variety of rhetorical modes encountered at the college level. Each day, students will have either a rough draft or a final draft of an essay due. Successful completion of this course satisfies Critical Thinking and Composition graduation requirement.

Prerequisite: Students must have an "A" or a "B" in their most recent Honors English course or an "A" in their most recent College Prep English course. Students who do not meet this requirement must apply with prior signed consent of the English Department Chairperson or the Academic Vice Principal.

Introduction to Expository Thinking and Composition (Entering 10 - 12th grade, Open to Chaminade students only)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per course

This intensive, accelerated writing course is most suitable for incoming sophomores or juniors who are already strong, proficient writers. Condensing the regular 18-week curriculum into 2 weeks, this course focuses on the basics of expository composition. Students work on thesis

statement development, paragraph and essay structure, syntax and grammar strategies, and other elements of essay composition. Additionally, students will practice writing in a variety of rhetorical styles including narrative, descriptive, argumentative, and process analysis. Successful completion of this course satisfies the Introduction to Expository Composition graduation requirement.

Prerequisite: Students must have an "A" or a "B" in their most recent Honors English course or an "A" in their most recent College Prep English course. Students who do not meet this requirement must apply with prior signed consent of the English Department Chairperson or the Academic Vice Principal.

Mathematics

Algebra I AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course presents the traditional Algebra content with modern concepts. Topics for this course will be selected from the AB syllabus. Emphasis is placed on individual work and completion of assigned homework.

Algebra II AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21- July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12- July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course presents the traditional Algebra II/Trigonometry content with modern concepts. Topics for this course will be selected from the AB syllabus. Emphasis is placed on individual work and completion of assigned homework.

Geometry AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 8

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12- July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course presents the essentials of traditional Euclidean Geometry with an introduction to some Modern Geometry. Topics for this course will include fundamental theorems, constructions, and area-volume type applications.

Math Analysis AB (Entering 10th - 11th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course is designed for the student who is not yet ready for a full year of Pre-Calculus. Specifically for students who earned a “C” in Algebra 2. The course contains many of the topics covered in Pre-calculus, but the less rigorous problems are emphasized. The course also starts with a good review of important algebra topics.

Pre-Calculus AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course emphasizes the analysis of functions to provide a fundamental background for the study of Calculus. Topics for this course include solutions of polynomial equations, complex numbers, vectors and the extension on the study of trigonometric and logarithmic functions.

Science

Biology AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$435 per semester (includes lab fee)

This lab-based course is designed to give the student a basic but thorough introduction to biological science. Topics in this course include cells, biological chemistry, anatomy and physiology, and genetics.

Chemistry AB (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$435 per semester (includes lab fee)

This lab-based course is designed to give students an introduction to the scientific method. Topics in this course include atomic theory, kinetic theory, solution, the periodic table, atomic structure, chemical bonding, energy effects in chemical reactions, equilibrium, acids and bases, and oxidation-reduction.

Foreign Language

Spanish I (Entering 9th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

Listening for comprehension and speaking within a limited scope is the goal of the course. Emphasis is on correct use of basic language structures in speaking, reading and writing.

Spanish II (Entering 9th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course builds upon material from Spanish I. It expands reading and speaking skills and continues practice of the correct use of grammar and verb forms, as well as idioms. Students' listening comprehension is enhanced in a lab setting with the use of audio cassettes of native speakers. Almost all of the instruction is in Spanish.

Spanish III (Entering 9th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course further develops aural-oral skills through more varied listening and speaking activities, such as discussing current events and reporting daily news. There are also reading materials and activities that explore Spanish culture. Spanish III completes the study of basic language structure and places a strong emphasis on conversational skills.

French I – IV (Entering 9th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - F 8:00 AM - 1:00 pm

Fee: \$410 per semester

French language review courses are intended for students who have struggled in language and are required to retake this course or would like to build their skills before moving on to the next level. Students will be required to purchase a text.

Online Classes

Social Studies

AP Psychology Online (Entering 11th - 12th grade)

June 21 - July 30

Fee: \$410

Advanced Placement Psychology introduces the student to the systematic and scientific study of the behavior and mental processes of human beings and other animals. Students are exposed to the psychological facts, principles and phenomena associated with each of the major subfields within psychology. Students further learn about the methods psychologists use in their science and practice. This course prepares students for the AP exam in Psychology. All assignments and instruction will be completed online. Students who enroll in this course will need to have reliable internet access during the 6-weeks of the virtual course. In addition, students will have access to AP Psychology review modules online 4 weeks prior to the AP exam to further help them pass the examination. Mathematics

AP Statistics Online (Entering 11th - 12th grade)

June 21 - July 30

Fee: \$410

This course introduces the major concept and tools for collecting, analyzing, and drawing conclusions from data. Students are exposed to four broad conceptual themes: exploring data (observing patterns and departures from patterns, planning a study (data collecting and conducting surveys and experiments), anticipating patterns (using probability theory, binomial distribution, normal distribution, and simulations of sampling distributions, statistical inference guides the selection of appropriate models to draw conclusions from data (confidence intervals, tests of significance, and special case of normally distributed data, i.e. t-distribution). This course prepares students for the AP exam in Statistics. All assignments and instruction will be completed online. Students who enroll in this course will need to have reliable internet access during the 6-weeks of the virtual course.

English

Expository Composition Online (Entering 10th grade)

June 21 - July 30

Fee: \$410

The goal of this six week intensive course is to help students become confident and effective writers in the early part of their high school career, learning skills that will benefit their writing across the curriculum. Using the writing process (drafting, peer editing, and conscientious revision) students will write in a variety of expository modes, such as description, personal narrative, process, analysis, and argumentation essays. Research, developing theses, providing support, and structuring ideas are also skills which are honed. This course is online, which means students should have regular and dependable access to the internet, a proficient understanding of the course's software (DyKnow, Blackboard, and Word) be able to attend weekly virtual office hours, and the maturity, and discipline to be a self-motivated learner

PREREQUISITE:

An A in English from your freshman year

English teacher recommendation due to Mr. Williamson by May 14, 2010.

Regular and dependable access to the internet

Proficient skills with the following software: (Blackboard, DyKnow, and Word)

Remedial Study Group Classes

These courses are open for credit to Chaminade students only. Non-Chaminade students may opt to take these classes as workshops for review and enrichment but without transcriptable credit. These remedial courses are intended for students who need to make up a “D” or “F” grade before continuing on in a subject area. Each class is taught in a small study-group format, with an emphasis placed on individual educational programs for each student. Students meet with their instructor as indicated in each course description. First semester material is covered in Semester I and second semester material is covered in Semester II. These classes are contingent on the agreement of an instructor; meeting times may be changed at the discretion of the instructor.

English

Freshmen Literature (Entering 10th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course is intended to focus on two major areas of study: literature and composition. The freshman writing program includes an intensive study of sentence structure, paragraph development, and early forms of the five-paragraph essay. Literature study is genre-based, including a unit on mythology.

American Literature (Entering 11th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course is designed to focus on five genres of American Literature: essay, short story, drama and poetry. The writing component emphasizes the longer expository essay and writing about literature. Students are also taught the basics of research and writing a term paper.

British Literature (Entering 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course includes the study of English epics, dramas, short stories, satires, and poetry from the Anglo-Saxon period to the twentieth century. The writing component includes literary analysis, essay tests, and research skills.

Twelfth Grade Elective English (Post 12th grade)

Semester I June 21 - July 7

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 12 - July 28

M - Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course will cover the specific area of study that the exiting seniors need to fulfill graduation requirements. Curriculum will be arranged with the teacher on an individual basis.

Science

Conceptual Physical Science (Entering 10th - 11th grade)

Semester I June 22 - July 6

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 13 - July 27

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course reviews the basic concepts in the physical and chemical nature of matter. Topics to be covered include changes in matter, matter and energy in motion, alternatives for energy, and the future of matter and energy.

Social Sciences

Physical and Cultural Geography (Entering 10th grade)

Semester I June 22 - July 6

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 13 - July 27

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course reviews the basic concepts in the student's awareness of place, location skills and understanding, exploration of the interaction of humans and their environment, analysis of human movement, and it develops an understanding of world regions.

World History (Entering 11th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 22 - July 6

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 13 - July 27

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course reviews the historical events and the cultural, economic, political and social developments that occurred in the period beginning with the River Valley Civilizations and ending with the Post Cold War Era.

United States History (Entering 11th - 12th grade)

Semester I June 22 - July 6

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Semester II July 13- July 27

T Th 1:00 - 3:00 PM

Fee: \$410 per semester

This course reviews the development, progression and interconnection of ideas and events in the Americas, and specifically the United States of America.

Religion Independent Studies

These courses are open for credit to Chaminade students only. These remedial courses are intended for students who need to make up a “D” or “F” grade before continuing on in a subject area or must complete their community service component from their junior religion course. Students meet with their instructor at time designated by instructor. These classes are contingent on the agreement of an instructor; meeting times may be changed at the discretion of the instructor.

Religion Independent Study (Entering 10th - 12th grade)

Students who did not complete the community service component of their junior religion class, *Jesus: His Mission and Message* and/or *Social Justice*, will complete their service and written reflections through this course. This class will be an independent study and each student will coordinate meeting times with the instructor.

Workshops & Camps

Chaminade VEX Robotics Camp (Entering 7th- 12th grade) **NEW!!**

Fee: \$ 1000

Think. Create. Build. Amaze. Welcome to the fast-growing world of competitive high school robotics. The VEX Robotics Camp will allow campers to build their own robots and bring them back to their school. No experience is required, just your imagination and your desire to build. The workshop is offered to all students entering 7th-12th grade. The cost includes the materials for the robot (Dual Control Starter Bundle) and will allow it to be controlled by human operator or run autonomously.

Playwriting Workshop (Entering 8th – 12th grade) **NEW!!**

Fee: \$250 per session

In this workshop students will develop ideas, create characters, plot storylines and, by the end of the class, complete a one-act play. Students will develop ideas using free-writing, improvisational acting games and peer critique. They will stage readings of their own and others' works. Students should be comfortable reading and acting in front of their peers.

Forensics Camp (Entering 8th- 10th grade) **NEW!!**

June 14th- June 18th 8:30 AM- 2:00 PM

Fee: \$250

This camp is designed as an introduction to competitive high school forensics (speech and debate). You will learn about the kinds of speech and debate events offered at the high school level and--best of all--you will receive coaching which will prepare you to compete in speech events beginning in the fall of 2010. Please bring a laptop, a spiral notebook, pens, and pencils to every class. No previous experience in speech or debate is necessary. Class is limited to 20 students, and since some forensics events are "partner" events, you are encouraged to enroll in this class with a friend who is also interested in competitive forensics. Application Boot Camp (Entering 12th grade- Chaminade Students Only)

Members of the Chaminade Class of 2011 are invited to reduce the stress over the college application process by joining Chaminade college counselors and English teachers for three productive mornings at the Application Boot Camp. Students will brainstorm essay ideas and craft a memorable application essay along with working on the UC essay prompts. By the conclusion of the workshop you will learn about the different types of college applications, you should have completed your first Common Application and be familiar with college supplements.

SAT Prep Course (Entering 10th-12th grade) NEW!!

June 21st- June 25th 8:00 AM- 12:00 PM

Fee: \$200

SAT Prep is a course designed to help prepare students for the SAT test. In addition to reviewing the basic verbal and mathematical skills assessed on the SAT test, students have access to test-taking strategies specific to the exam, real student work samples with explanations, grading rubrics for peer and self-assessment, and essays prompts. Instruction, followed by collaborative, guided, and independent practice, provides the foundation for the course. Upon successful completion, students will possess the tools necessary to complete the SAT to the best of their ability.

Chaminade Chess Workshop (Entering 7th-12th grade) NEW !!

The workshop is designed to learn the secrets of winning tactics and strategies in the universal game of chess. Students will learn skills that transcend the chess board and apply to real life settings. Making calculated decisions, anticipating, recognizing patterns, and analyzing changing data will be stressed in the workshop. The workshop is open to all levels of players from beginning to advance. Not only will students learn and appreciate the wonderful game of chess, they will have tons of fun in the process.

Chaminade Drama Workshop (Entering 7th- 12th grade) NEW!!

June 28- July 2 10:00 AM – 4:00 PM

Fee: \$250

If you are interested in learning the art of drama or to continue your study of the theater then this camp is for you. The week long Drama Workshop includes intensive acting technique, monologue and scene study, vocal coaching and song interpretation culminating in a performance of their monologues, scenes and songs for families and friends. Open to all levels of thespians. The workshop is being led by Chaminade High School Drama Director, Mrs. Yvette Bishop.

General Information

Faculty

Highly qualified teachers, who are certified by Chaminade's administration, teach all courses. Whenever possible, members of Chaminade's regular faculty are employed.

GPA Calculation

If a student received a "D" or an "F" grade during the school year, the grade earned during Summer School WILL NOT REPLACE the "D" or "F" grade. For Chaminade students, Summer School grades will appear in addition to your original grade in your official transcript. Chaminade will use both of these grades in the calculation of your Chaminade GPA. Non-Chaminade students should contact their school administration as to their policy on how classes at Chaminade will calculate in their GPA and whether or not the course and grade will appear on that school's transcript. For further clarification, please contact the Guidance Office at 818.347.8300.

Grades and Transcripts

Grade reports will be mailed the week following the end of each session. Grade reports will be mailed to the home address listed in the Summer registration materials. For non-Chaminade students, an official transcript will be mailed to your high school on or about August 8th. This transcript serves as proof of completion of credits toward graduation. For Chaminade students, summer grades are automatically entered into Chaminade transcripts. If an additional transcript is needed, please contact the Chaminade Registrar at 818.347.8300 ext. 314.

Attendance

Daily attendance is mandatory. Since classes are intensive, a semester lasting only 13 days, absences must be for emergency situations only. Students may accumulate only 1.5 days (7.5 hours) of absence per session. Absence in excess of this amount will result in the student being dropped from the course with no credit and no refund of tuition. Tardiness will not be tolerated. Two unexcused class tardies will count as one full absence. Chaminade maintains a closed, secure campus at all times. No students may leave the campus during school hours for any reason without checking out through the office with a parent's note. Students MAY NOT leave campus during class breaks.

Dress Code

Students are expected to dress appropriately and casually for Summer School. The following is not acceptable attire: No sleeveless/tank tops; No bare midriffs; No short skirts; No hats of any kind; No baggy pants; No swimsuits; No brief tops; No sandals (shoes must have a closed toe and heel). Additionally, NO FACIAL HAIR and NO UNNATURAL HAIR COLOR is permitted. Students violating the dress code will be sent home at the discretion of the Summer School Director, and an absence will be recorded for that day.

Student Handbook Applicability

All school rules, policies and discipline structures that are contained in the current Chaminade Student Handbook are to be followed by the students and enforced by the faculty and administration. This includes the Interquest drug/alcohol/weapon deterrent program. Chaminade and non-Chaminade students are responsible for being aware and abiding by the rules and policies of Chaminade College Preparatory. Light snacks and soft-drinks will be available daily from 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM. Food service and vending machines are in the Bob Hope Student Center and will be available during breaks. No food is allowed in class.

Scheduling

Scheduling is done on a first-come first-serve basis. Student schedules will be made available as soon as their class is full and confirmed for the Summer Semester. Classes and times are subject to change. No accommodations can be made for special requests such as specific teachers or vacation absences. Classes meet as scheduled in this guide.

Schedule Changes and Refunds

Schedule changes may be requested through the Summer School office from June 1 – June 18. The add/drop deadline is the start of the first day of the session. No schedule changes will be made once Summer School classes have begun. Fees are non-refundable, Tuition is non-refundable once the the class meets for the first time.

Course Cancellation

Chaminade reserves the right to cancel any class that does not meet a minimum enrollment. A full refund will be made to students in any classes cancelled by Chaminade. Course cancellations are made at the latest possible time to allow the greatest chance for opening the class. Final course decisions for Semester I are made on or before June 16. Final course decisions for Semester II are made on or before July 1.

Text Books

Information on purchasing textbooks and related materials will be available online on the Chaminade Summer Program Webpage. Some remedial classes will use the same text as is used during the school year. Most books are purchased online through VarsityBooks.com. Book purchase information will be available online as well.
